

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You usually can find Roy Sakuma in his quaint Kaimuki studio, giving ukulele lessons, while his next batch of students—young, old and everything in between—wait outside for their turn. If you don't already know, Roy is an ukulele player. He's small kine famous. He established the Ukulele Festival Hawai'i, the largest of it's kind in the world; owns Roy Sakuma Productions (the label behind Ka'au Crater Boys!); has ukulele studios around the island; passionately taught thousands of students to love the instrument and so many more accomplishments.

Instead of being at his studio on March 17<sup>th</sup>, Roy was with us at the Salvation Army Kroc Center, speaking to our Common Grace kids. He spilled out his heart about his childhood. He was ashamed of who he was. He hated himself. He covered his eyes when he combed his hair because he disliked his face. The person he was the closest to, his father, disowned him. He dropped out of high school. People teased him. He was so hurt by everyone that he started to hurt people too, even if he was unaware of it.

Just about everyone in the room raised their hands when Roy asked, "How many of you have been hurt through the words or actions of your parents, siblings, peers or friends?" The kids listened intently, because Roy spoke genuinely and vulnerably. He told them to begin loving themselves and hold their judgments against others because if they looked around, almost everyone had raised their hands and was hurting.





In closing, Roy shared a song which said, "I am what I am, I'll be what I'll be—look can't you see, it's me!" We all sang along and believed the words we were saying. Thank you Roy, for helping us to love ourselves and in turn, helping us to love others.
